May have been sung in call response style. King says the beginning of the verse then the congregation answers.

As the hymn unfolds, the psalmist leads the congregation to reflect on four manifestations of God's enduring, steadfast love: the creation (136:4-9), Israel's deliverance from slavery (136:10-16), the heritage of a promised home (136:17-22), and his gracious, ongoing provision for their daily needs (136:23-25).

The difference between this recounting of history and the other accounts in Psalm is the line His Steadfast love Endures forever.

Psalm 136- His Steadfast Love Endures Forever

[1] Give thanks to the LORD, for he is good, for his steadfast love endures forever.

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- [2] Give thanks to the God of gods, for his steadfast love endures forever.
- [3] Give thanks to the Lord of lords, for his steadfast love endures forever:
- [4] to him who alone does great wonders, for his steadfast love endures forever;
- [5] to him who by understanding made the heavens, for his steadfast love endures forever:
- [6] to him who spread out the earth above the waters, for his steadfast love endures forever;
- [7] to him who made the great lights, for his steadfast love endures forever;

Is this too much? What *is* the psalmist's point in keeping this refrain front and center throughout? Is it too much?

Listen to one commentary on this Psalm....

The refrain serves as a spiritual speed bump. It slows us down. Its repetition draws our attention again and again to God. It reminds us that absolutely everything that happened in Israel's history is purposeful and is tethered to the steadfast love of God. Creation. Rescue from slavery. Sustenance in the wilderness. Inheritance of the promised land. Through good and bad. thick and thin, sin and suffering, God is accomplishing his good purposes in his people. The psalmist beckons God's people to take notice of this glorious reality. "Slow down, brothers and sisters, and repeat after me: the steadfast love of God endures forever." Steadfast love. These are the very words of self-identification God used as he spoke to Moses in Exodus 34:6: "The LORD, the LORD, a God merciful and gracious, slow to anger, and abounding in steadfast love and faithfulness." His face looms behind the facts of Israel's

journey.
